#### **Achievement**

At Columbus Collegiate Academy - West (CCAW) we measure proficiency longitudinally in terms of annual progress on Ohio State Tests (AIR) and interim progress during the school year on the i-Ready assessment in reading and math.

### State Testing (AIR)

CCAW administered the Ohio State Tests (AIR) for the second time during the 2017-2018 school year. This was the second school year that the test was taken online. In previous years the PARCC (2014-2015) and OAA (2012-2013) state tests were administered. The State AIR tests are administered annually in order to measure student proficiency on state mandated academic standards for each grade level. The State AIR tests allow CCAW to compare their results with traditional Columbus City Schools (CCS) as well as schools across Ohio.

#### District and State Comparison

The AIR tests were administered in the Spring of 2018. Columbus Collegiate Academy - West students outperformed the Columbus City Schools average in all tested subjects. CCAW 6th graders outperformed the district by over 20% in 6th grade math and 8th grade science.

#### Comparison with similar schools

In order to consider our academic progress in context, CCAW evaluated its rank by performance index compared to the Columbus and Southwestern district schools students could attend if not enrolled at CCAW.

#### i-Ready

CCAW students take the i-Ready diagnostic assessment in the fall, winter, and spring each school year. The i-Ready assessments are state-aligned, computer-adaptive tests that accurately reflect the instructional level of each student and measure growth over time.

The assessment itself is unique in that it adapts to the student's ability, accurately measuring what a child knows and needs to learn. The diagnostic assessment pinpoints students' needs in reading and math down to the domain and sub-skill level by using sophisticated adaptive logic, and a bank of thousands of test items. Millions of test records have been collected over the last several years which allows us to compare our students' scores and growth with those of 6th, 7th, and 8th graders across the United States.

## **Program Profile**

Columbus Collegiate Academy - West provides a college-preparatory, middle grades education to students in Columbus, Ohio. Columbus Collegiate delivers academic and character development programming that prepares students to gain entry and succeed in the most demanding high schools and colleges. Critical to meeting the CCA mission are the following program elements.

- An intensive curriculum with a strong focus on skill development, especially in reading, writing, science, and mathematics.
- A highly structured environment that encourages and rewards positive decisions and offers immediate feedback and coaching when less-desirable decisions are made.
- Extended class time in literacy and mathematics (6th grade) to ensure proficiency in basic skills for all students.
- Regular homework to ensure skill development and content mastery.
- Interventions for core academics, homework completion, organization and behavior through a school-wide, small-group advisory system.
- A simple uniform that supports respect for self and others and diminishes social stress.

Columbus Collegiate Academy - West also partners with a variety of organizations to ensure students have access to a world-class, well-rounded education. A sample of partner organizations and their role at CCA-West are listed below:

- The Columbus Idea Foundry Provides after-school technology enrichment to a group of 20 students. The CIF also runs two labs for all 7th and 8th grade science students throughout the school year.
- COSI Provides in-class labs three times a year for students during their science class.
- Promusica Two classes of violin are offered to 30 scholars through the Promusica partnership. Promusica provides the violin teacher and instruments.
- Columbus Zoo Teaches six classes to our 6th grade scholars and provides field trips to the zoo and The Wilds.
- Harmony Project Offers a choir and service program to students during lunch.
- Columbus Children's Theater Offers theater electives to all students on a rotating,
  9-week basis.
- Columbus School of Art and Design Provides art instruction as an elective to CCAW students.
